The Committee on Alcohol & Pregnancy (CAP) was established by the Manitoba Medical Association in 1993. Its mandate is to implement recommendations made at the community consultation on Fetal Alcohol Syndrome/Fetal Alcohol Effects (FAS/FAE) held in Winnipeg in June 1993. The inter-disciplinary committee has two broad aims: to develop a Manitoba FAS/FAE Network throughout the Province, and to promote initiatives regarding FAS/FAE in Manitoba. CAP's 30 members represent a diverse cross-section of individuals, groups, and communities concerned with FAS/FAE. They participate on behalf of parents (including birth, adoptive, and foster) and professionals in the health, education, social service, and correctional sectors. There is strong representation from the aboriginal community and from the addictions field. In order to facilitate action on the main objectives of the project, a number of working groups and sub committees have been set up:

#### **WORKING GROUPS:**

- The Prevention & Education working group is developing possible approaches to preventing FAS/FAE in the highest risk populations, and assessing what is being taught about FAS in Manitoba schools and universities.
- The Health & Treatment working group is developing guidelines for referral and diagnosis of children suspected of having FAS/FAE, identifying populations at risk and developing strategies to assess the freguency of the problem in Manitoba.
- The Family Support/Community Social Services group is addressing the need to develop effective ways to support parents (birth, foster, or adoptive) of FAS/FAE children, and assist them in accessing resources.

### FAS/FAE RESOURCE CENTRE

The FAS/FAE Resource Centre is located at the Addictions Foundation of Manitoba (AFM), 1031 Portage Avenue in Winnipeg. The aim is to foster communication, sharing and cooperation throughout Manitoba, leading to the development of initiatives that effectively prevent FAS/FAE and respond to the needs of those who are affected. A data base has been established which includes agencies, groups and individuals in the province who are concerned with the problem of FAS/FAE. Also underway is the publication of a FAS/FAE Resource Service Directory of diagnostic and treatment centres, resource services, and family support groups.

The Addiction Foundation Library provides up-to-date books, videotapes and pamphlets on FAS/FAE. It is located at the AFM and cooperates with the FAS/FAE Resource Centre. A distribution system is in place to provide access to AFM regional offices around the province including locations with a Native Alcohol & Drug Abuse Program (NADAP) office.

## **PROGRAM PROFILES**

# Interagency FAS/E Prevention and Intervention Program

A new project is underway for FAS/FAE children, aged 0 to 6 years, and their caregivers. The program has been developed by Mount Carmel Clinic, Pregnancy Distress Inc., Winnipeg Child and Family Services and The Children's Home of Winnipeg. The program focuses on early identification and intervention with children and families involved with the Mount Carmel Daycare and the Daycare at Young Parents Community Centre. Staff provide caregivers with training and support, and create environments appropri-

ate for FAS/FAE children to function and learn. The project also has a prevention component to promote the growth of healthy babies through the work of staff with women of childbearing age. Substance abuse issues are addressed with clients of the partner organizations, and support is provided to clients on an ongoing basis.

# Manitoba Association of Registered Nurses (MARN) Fetal Alcohol Syndrome/Effect Position Statement

### The MARN Position on FAS/FAE is that:

- fetal alcohol syndrome is completely preventable;
- · both men and women need to take responsibility for the prevention of FAS/FAE;
- there is no known "safe" level of alcohol consumption during pregnancy therefore abstinence should be recommended to women where there is or may be a pregnancy;
- prevention of FAS/FAE requires identification of the social and economic sources of alcohol abuse;
- prevention programs should focus on education of the public at large especially school children, school teachers, health care professionals, and men and women who use/ misuse substances; and
- care and treatment of those affected by FAS/FAE should include family and community.
  Though the effects cannot be erased, interventions can be applied to optimize the
  affected child's potential, and to maintain the integrity of the family. Families and
  communities with FAS/FAE children require a great deal of support to raise these
  children and to break the recurrent cycle of FAS/FAE (CNA Brief to the House of
  Commons, 1992).

# **FAMILY SUPPORT**

## Fetal Alcohol Support Network of Manitoba

The Fetal Alcohol Support Network provides support for caregivers and families of fetal alcohol affected children. Members in the group include foster and adoptive parents, as well as birth parents and FAS affected individuals. Network members provide each other with a wealth of hands-on experience in dealing with FAS children and accessing appropriate services for them. Approximately 25 people meet monthly in an informal setting. In the last 6 months, topics discussed have included; advocacy in the school system; non-violent crisis intervention; FAS children in daycare; and dealing with behaviours. # NC THERN COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

A major initiative of the Committee on Alcohol and Pregnancy is to promote the development of community consultations in Manitoba's north. The initial concept was to convene one large event. However, it became clear that one event could not possibly fill the needs of such a vast area. Plans were modified so that several events of varying size being are held, organized by local committees with help from the Northern Consult committee in Winnipeg. Senior High. Animated unborn bables with real-life mothers motivate adolescents to avoid the harmful effects of using alcohol.
